"My Editorial" by 7th grader Joseph Goldenbogen

Recycling is processing used materials into new products. We make millions of tons of trash each year. 54.2% of what we throw away ends up in a landfill: that's more than half of what we throw away! Recycling saves the Earth.

Kersten Goldenbogen notes, "I love recycling; I love to reuse. I think it is important." She also says, "It teaches us to reuse what we have. I also think that landfills block our access to natural resources. The more you recycle, the longer the Earth will last." Mother Earth has taken care of us and given us a place to live. We need to show her that we are thankful by recycling and helping her last as long as she can. A lot of people are always talking about doomsday but if we don't start taking care of the Earth and keeping it clean, that doomsday really will happen.

We have a very good population of trees but if we don't start recycling more paper and cutting less trees down, then we won't have the trees that we have today, and all of our animal population will go down and we won't have any more animals in the world. The bottom line is, we need to start recycling everything we can.

Recycling is easy. In fact, most of what we use in our kitchen can be recycled. An example, when you finish a cereal box, you can fold it up and recycle it. When you finish a jar of pasta

Do you always eat all the food on your plate? When you do not do you think about the people that would give an arm for that food? We are wasteful plain and simple. But others need that food and we just throw it out. Some are so hungry they eat out of landfills. Little kids compete to find one moldy cob of corn so they do not starve.

In 2008 according to "The Forgotten Harvest," nearly 1 in 4 households with children said there was a time in the past year that they could not afford to buy food that their family needed. They also say 1 in 6 Americans faced hunger and that included 17 million children. Americans throw away 40% of food. That is about a pound a day. Don't you think that maybe that food could go to others who need it?

On an international level in places like Haiti and Africa people are so poor we can not even imagine. Some people have to eat mud cookies to survive because they have nothing else to eat. And mud cookies are 100% mud and dirt. We at home in the U.S. throw out over 40% of our real food with nutritional value. There should be at least enough to make sure people are not eating mud.

I am not saying you have to donate food right now to "Feed the Children" or the local food bank, but do not waste and donate extra instead. Do not take what you will not eat.
