Financial Aid for 2012-13

Enclosed is your July statement. If there are no charges, that means we haven't yet received your re-registration paperwork (and, therefore, we don't know if you're planning to return!).

School families who requested financial aid through the Archdiocese of Detroit "PSAS" application: response / award letters were sent out the last week of June. If you applied for local aid through the Father Bartone fund, you should have received a reply indicating the amount (if any) of your award by the first of July. Save your letters as proof of your awards until those credits appear on your statements.

Archdiocesan grants will show up as credits on your tuition statement by mid-November; Father Bartone awards will show up as credits on your tuition statement by March 2013.

Applications for the second round of Bartone grants are being accepted (with awards to be made in January).

School families: now that you know the dollar figure of your aid, you may include it in calculating your payments. By the end of this month, you should have paid all the fees plus 30% of your share of tuition. (Preschool families: your \$130 registration fee should be paid by now, with your first of 9 regular tuition payments due in August.) Please contact Mrs. Steinmetz in the office if you have any questions.

SCRIP credits

Congratulations to the 40-some families who are sharing in over \$8000 in SCRIP credits this quarter! These folks have figured out how to make their everyday shopping help pay their tuition!

If your registration paperwork is in, your SCRIP credit is showing up on your 2012-13 tuition statement (or on your latchkey or service credit statement). If you have any questions about your credit, contact Mrs. Steinmetz in the office or Mrs. Patty Smith at the SCRIP desk.

Sports Physicals

Any student wishing to participate on any school sports team next year will need a sports physical. Summer is a great time to get that taken care of with little disruption to your school schedule. A blank physical form was included in your "summer study" packet, and is also available on the school website.

Your own doctor may do your sports physical. St. Clair County Health Department's "Teen Health Center" offers them for approximately \$40 (or on a sliding fee scale, depending on family income); they also accept many insurances. Call first for an appointment: 810.987.1311. The Center is located at 2215 Court Street, Port Huron (enter off 20th Street, behind Port Huron High School between the tennis courts and pool). Check at "Prompt Care" centers or "Minute Clinics"—you may be able to have your physical done inexpensively at such places.

Take Time to Work Directly With Your Child on Reading

You don't have to be an expert in reading to help your child excel in reading, researchers have found. All you have to do is take time to work directly with your child on his reading.

Doing things like these can greatly improve your child's achievement.

- Listen to your child tell stories and read aloud.
- Read to your child. (Use books recorded on tape if needed.)
- Help your child sound out letters and words.
- Watch as your child copies letters and words
- Say a word and let your child spell it.
- Play letter or word games with your child. (Ask your child's teacher or a librarian to give you some ideas.)

Have Your Child Finish a Story

How many times has your child said, "Read me a story"? Now it's your turn to say this. Next time your child asks for a story, begin one, but let him finish it. This will build his verbal and creative skills.

Expect Elementary Aged Children to Do Some Chores!

Some parents get into the habit of doing things for their children. It's not until they talk with other parents that they realize that other kids make their own beds, prepare their own lunches or put dishes in the dishwasher.

What can parents reasonably expect elementary school children to do? Here's a partial list:

- Fix snacks.
- Get themselves up in the morning.
- Make their bed.
- Change the sheets on their bed.
- Load and empty the dishwasher.
- Take clothes out of the dryer.
- Fold towels or washcloths after they come out of the dryer.
- Make a salad.
- Read to a younger brother or sister.
- Help a younger sister or brother with spelling words.
- Pack their backpack for school the next day.
- **Give permission slips** to a parent.
- Make sure signed permission slips go back in the backpack.
